A MESSAGE FROM OUR CEO

My Health My Resources of Tarrant County works in the public interest and while our delivery of services and supports may have looked a little different the last few years thanks to the pandemic, our staff continued to help people with disabilities access services in our community and empower them to live their best lives. Our services range from:

- Early Childhood Intervention services that support babies with developmental delays and their families through the childhood period with supports in the schools as well as mental health and substance use disorder services for adolescents.
- Adults with mental health or substance use disorders can receive outpatient services in clinics located around the county as well as brief residential programs.
- For people with intellectual and developmental disabilities (or IDD such as diagnosis like Autism Spectrum Disorder and Cerebral Palsy) we provide case management to assist them and their families in making life work after they complete special education services in school. We also have 13 small group homes that enable people with IDD to live a regular life in regular communities.

Our services are primarily state-funded and available to people regardless of insurance. For people who don't have health insurance we can cover the cost of doctor visits and/or medications.

Some services might assist people who might not be sure what they need: We answer 988 calls (formerly The National Suicide Prevention Lifeline) for a 73 county region and we link people with services in their communities and assist them in figuring out what they need.

We also have a 24/7 ICARE Crisis Line that encourages callers to reach out if they or a loved one might be experiencing a psychiatric crisis. We can assist with determining what level assistance the person needs and a response that ranges from establishing a routine appointment for care to deployment of a Mobile Crisis Team for onsite help.

For children we also offer some specialized navigation resources. We have a nationally known program called Help Me Grow that assists caller with resources to assist young children. Assistance can be as simple as helping a caller sort through online options for care or as extensive as linking the family with appropriate community resources and continued contact to be sure the referral is effective for the family. We also have an enhancement of this program called Help Me Thrive that is navigation for families of kids throughout the developmental period. In addition, we provide navigators on some FWISD campuses to assist students, families and school personnel to link to community resources.

We work extensively with Community Partners including JPS, law enforcement agencies, Juvenile Justice, Tarrant County Jail and non-profit providers such as ACH Services and Alliance for Children to assist them serving people with complex needs.

We have over 2,000 employees who work for us helping our communities assist more than 70,000 people with disabilities each year.

I thank our Board of Trustees, Employees, Patients and Volunteers for their work to help change lives in Tarrant and surrounding counties.






People Served by Age


- 0-2

Behavioral Health Highlights

Genoa Healthcare Pharmacy

Genoa Healthcare Pharmacy is MHMR's contracted pharmacy. There are six on-site Genoa Pharmacies at our outpatient clinic locations: Penn Square, Mid Cities, Northwest, Arlington and Circle Drive.

The elimination of barriers, such as travel and timeliness, were key factors in the decision to bring Genoa pharmacies to all five MHMR locations.

The goal of having these pharmacies on site is to ensure those we serve have access to their medication, are encouraged to utilize the resource and see its effectiveness in their lives.

MHMR Recertified as Certified Community Behavioral Health Clinic (CCBHC)

Texas Health and Human Services Commission (HHSC) recertified MHMR for 3 years as a Certified Community Behavioral Health Clinic (CCBHC) in Texas.

Reviewers commended the agency on submission, including staffing plans to provide needed services, health information technology, and using our needs assessment to improve care, as well as the caring and enthusiasm staff showed in their interviews.



Our recertification reflects the commitment of MHMR, at all levels, to the CCBHC model of care.

Achieving this recertification is the end result of months of hard work that has touched almost every part of the agency. This is thanks to MHMR employees who documented workflows, updated and reviewed operating procedures, looking closely at the way we provide person-centered care.

Disability Services Highlights

TANF Funding Complete, Celebrated!

MHMR received notice the agency was awarded \$1.2 million in Pandemic Emergency Assistance Funds through Temporary Assistance for Needy Family (TANF) that would provide short-term financial assistance for up to 4 months for people facing hardships due to the pandemic.

The Grants Team along with Disability Services was tasked with awarding patients, families and


staff these funds.

Funds covered rental assistance, utilities, groceries, and everyday items needed for more than 250 people.

The team accomplished the plan to spend all \$1.2 million within six weeks of receiving the funding.

MHMR received an additional \$25k from a community partner to spend before midnight. All funds were allocated to patients and staff before the deadline.







Community Dances

Thanks to Chula Chaser sponsorship, Disability Services has restarted a community beloved tradition — monthly dances.

MHMR group homes, community members and private providers are all invited.

More than 200 attendees monthly enjoy dancing, photos booths, snacks, and connecting with their friends.

Child and Family Services Highlights

Ellis County Family Resource Center

In partnership with the Ellis County Early Childhood Coalition and City of Ennis, Help Me Grow / Help Me Thrive North Texas open its second Family Resource Center inside the city's historic train depot building, located in Ennis, Texas town square.

The center provides a walk-in site for parents (with children perinatal through age 17) to meet with MHMR professionals who:

- · Conduct screenings and assessments;
- Connect families with community-based resources services supports they may need;
- Host events with information, giveaways, food, and fun activities for all ages;
- Offer an array of group services (e.g., Parent Cafés, story time, healthy eating, music & motion, and WOW Talk for teens);
- Collaborate with the local coalition, organizations, schools, and providers; and
- Promote family events, workshops, meetings, and parent groups.

All at no cost to families.



North Clinic Open House

To better serve families living in Tarrant County's northern region, MHMR's growing Child and Family Services opened its new trauma-informed coordinated care clinic in November 2023. Comprehensive services are provided for families and children (perinatal through age 17) that include:

- Early Childhood Services
- Youth Engagement Groups
- Parent Cafés
- Psychiatry Services
- Skills Training and Therapy
- Family Support
- Care Coordination


Fiscal Year 2023 Financials

Sept. 2022 - Aug. 2023




Total Expenses: \$213,425,472 Expenses by program:
